KEYNOTE PRESENTER

David Dodick, MD, is a professor of neurology at the Mayo Clinic College of Medicine and a consultant in neurology at the Mayo Clinic in Scottsdale, AZ. He is the program director of the Mayo Clinic Neurology Residency Program and the director of the Headache Program and the Sports Neurology and Concussion Program at Mayo Clinic. He is also an adjunct professor and international chairman of headache in the department of neurosciences at the Norwegian University of Science and Technology.

Dr. Dodick is board certified by the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada and the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology (ABPN). He also holds United Council for Neurologic subspecialties certification in headache medicine and ABPN certification in vascular neurology. He has authored more than 330 peer-reviewed publications and authored or edited 10 books. He is the chairman of the Sports Concussion Conference Workgroup and the Annual Sports Concussion Conference of the American Academy of Neurology and a member of the academy's Annual Meeting Committee.

He is on the editorial board of several journals, including *Lancet Neurology*, *Postgraduate Medicine*, *Headache*, and *Cephalalgia*. Dr. Dodick is president of the International Headache Society, chairman of the American Migraine Foundation, co-director of the U.S. Academic Headache Consortium, immediate past editor-in-chief of *Cephalalgia*, and past president of the American Headache Society.

FACULTY

Jessica Ailani, MD, is Associate Professor of Neurology and Director of the Georgetown Headache Center at MedStar Georgetown University Hospital in Washington, DC. She received her medical degree from the Stony Brook University School of Medicine in New York, followed by an internship at Winthrop University Hospital in Mineola, NY. Dr. Ailani subsequently completed a residency and Chief Residency in Neurology at NYU Langone Medical Center in New York, NY, followed by a fellowship in Headache Medicine at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia, PA. She is board certified in Neurology with subspecialty certification in Headache Medicine. Dr. Ailani is a fellow of the American headache society. She is on the executive board as a member at large. Dr. Ailani is the co-chair of the practice management group and is on the scientific program committee that helps plan the American Headache Society annual scientific meeting. She is also a member of the International Headache Society and the American Academy of Neurology. Dr. Ailani is Section Editor of Unusual Headache Syndromes for Current Pain and Headache Reports and a reviewer for several professional journals. Dr. Ailani has presented nationally on topics surrounding headache medicine.

Susan Beaird, DNP, NP, is a Pediatric Nurse Practitoner at Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt University School of Nursing.

Steve Bender, DDS, earned his Doctorate of Dental Surgery degree from Baylor College of Dentistry in Dallas, TX in 1986 and practiced general and comprehensive restorative dentistry for 14 years. He then studied orofacial pain and temporomandibular disorders at the Parker E. Mahan Facial Pain Center at the University of Florida College of Dentistry. From 2000-2015, Dr. Bender maintained a private practice devoted to pain management of the head and face, as well as sleep disorders. Beginning in 2016, he transitioned to a full-time faculty member at Texas A&M College of Dentistry in Dallas, TX in the department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery and assumed the role of director of facial pain and sleep medicine. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Orofacial Pain and has earned Fellowship in the American Academy of Orofacial Pain, the American Headache Society, the International Academy of Oral Oncology, and the American College of Dentists. He is a past president of the American Academy of Orofacial Pain as well as the Fourth District Dental Society of Texas and the Dallas Academy of General Dentistry. In addition, he serves as a consultant for the United States Army.

Chris Boes, MD, is a Professor of Neurology at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN. In his younger days, he completed a headache fellowship with Professor Peter Goadsby at the National Hospital for Neurology and Neurosurgery, Queen Square, London, UK. Dr. Boes is an Associate Dean in the Mayo Clinic School of Graduate Medical Education and Medical Director of the W. Bruce Fye Center for the History of Medicine at the Mayo Clinic. He is also a member of the American Academy of Neurology History and Archives Committee.

Rebecca Burch, MD, is a headache medicine specialist at the John R. Graham Headache Center, and is director of the BWH/MGH/Harvard Headache Medicine Fellowship. She also provides headache medicine care—including management of headache during and after pregnancy—at Brigham and Women's Hospital's Fish Center for Women's Health in Chestnut Hill, MA. Dr. Burch received her medical degree from the University of Massachusetts Medical School and completed her neurology residency at Boston Medical Center. She completed a fellowship in headache medicine at the John R. Graham Headache Center prior to joining the faculty, and is board certified in neurology and headache medicine. Her research interests include headache epidemiology, women's health, and medical education.

Rami Burnstein, PhD, is the John Hedley-Whyte Professor of Anaesthesia and Neuroscience at Harvard Medical School, and the Vice Chairman of Research in the Department of Anesthesia and Critical Care at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center. Professor Burstein is an appointed member of the Interagency Pain Research Coordinating Committee (IPRCC), which consists of representatives from the NIH, CDC, FDA, and the Department of Health and Human Services and whose mission is to implement the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act; and the current (Co)-Chairman of the Scientific Program Committee for the International Headache Conference meeting in 2019 and the European Headache Federation Annual Meeting in 2018. He is a past member of the Board of Directors of both the American and the International Headache Societies. Among Professor Burstein's accomplishments are the discoveries of the spinohypothalamic tract. peripheral and central sensitization role in migraine pathophysiology and treatment, mechanisms of action of several anti-migraine drugs, the neurobiology of photophobia, and most recently, the glymphatic system role in migraine. Throughout the years, he has received numerous awards for his discoveries. These include the prestigious Javits Neuroscience Merit Award (National Advisory Neurological Disorder and Stroke Council), the Harold Wolff Awards for 2003 and 2005 (American Headache Society), the Cephalalgia Awards for best papers published in Cephalalgia in 2013 and 2015 (International Headache Society), the Seymour Diamond Lectureship Award in 2012 and 2015, and the 2010 Alan Edwards Center for Research on Pain Award (McGill University). In the past 10 years, he has been serving as a reviewer for the NIH, the Welcome Trust, the Canadian Institute of Health Research, Science, the Dana Foundation Program in Brain and Immuno-imaging, Rita Allen Foundation, Brookdale Foundation, and the Ellison New Scholars Program in Aging.

Megan Donnelly, MD, board-certified neurologist, specializes in Headache Medicine and Women's Neurology. Her expertise with complex headaches includes migraine, chronic daily headache, trigeminal neuralgia, cluster headache, and occipital neuralgia, as well as medication overuse headache. Her specialization in women's neurology entails the treatment of neurological conditions during pregnancy and lactation. Dr. Donnelly is originally from Pittsburgh, PA and attended Allegheny College in Meadville, PA, for her undergraduate education and Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine in Erie, PA, for her medical degree. She completed neurology residency and headache fellowship at the Cleveland Clinic in Cleveland, OH. She also received specialized training in Women's Neurology at University of Pittsburgh Medical Center in Pittsburgh, PA. Prior to joining Novant Health, Dr. Donnelly practiced neurology for two years at the Cleveland Clinic as one of the first providers to offer specialized care in Women's Neurology. She also served as assistant professor of clinical neurology at the Cleveland Clinic Lerner College of Medicine.

Lauren Doyle Strauss, DO, is a UCNS pediatric headache specialist at the Comprehensive Headache Program at Wake Forest Baptist Health, which offers a multidisciplinary approach for the treatment of pediatric and adult patients with refractory headaches. She trained in

Child Neurology at Harvard's Boston Children's Hospital, is a graduate of the Headache Medicine fellowship at Brigham and Women's John R. Graham Headache Center, and is a Fellow of the American Headache Society. She is an Assistant Professor in the Wake Forest Department of Neurology and engaged in residency education as the Director for the Child Neurology residency program. She serves as Communication Director for the Southern Headache Society.

Carrie Dougherty, MD, FAHS, is assistant professor of neurology and program director of the headache medicine fellowship at MedStar Georgetown University Hospital in Washington, DC. She received her medical degree from Indiana University School of Medicine, followed by an internship at NorthShore University HealthSystem in Evanston, IL. Dr. Dougherty completed her neurology residency at Georgetown University Medical Center in Washington, DC, followed by a fellowship in headache medicine at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia, PA. She is board certified in neurology with subspecialty certification in headache medicine and is a fellow of the American Headache Society. She is a member of the AHS guidelines committee and was recently selected for the Emerging Leaders Program. She is secretary of the Southern Headache Society and a member of the American Academy of Neurology. She serves as a physician advocate with the Alliance for Headache Disorders Advocacy at Headache on the Hill.

Randolph Evans, MD, FAAN, FAHS, received his BA from Rice University in 1974 and MD from Baylor College of Medicine in 1978. Dr. Evans completed his internship and residency in Neurology at Baylor College of Medicine in 1982. He is board certified in Neurology and subspecialty certified in Headache Medicine, and is a fellow of the American Academy of Neurology, the American Headache Society, and the Texas Neurological Society. As clinical professor at Baylor College of Medicine, Dr. Evans is actively involved with the teaching of medical students and residents. He is on the staff of Park Plaza Hospital, the Methodist Hospital, and St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital. Dr. Evans has numerous publications. Books include the following: senior editor of Prognosis of Neurological Disorders, 1st and 2nd editions and editor of Neurology and Trauma, 1st and 2nd editions; latrogenic Disorders; Diagnostic Testing in Neurology; Neurologic Treatment; the Saunders Manual of Neurologic Practice; Case Studies in Neurology; Secondary Headache Disorders; Neurology Case Studies; Common Neurologic Disorders; Migraine and other Primary Headaches; and the co-author of Handbook of Headache, 1st and 2nd editions. Dr. Evans is an author of over 220 journal publications and 75 book chapters and is on the editorial boards of the publications Headache, Medlink Neurology, BMC Medicine, BMC Neurology, Headache Currents, Practical Neurology, Medscape Neurology and Neurosurgery, European Neurological Journal, Headache Research and Treatment, Frontiers in Headache Medicine and Facial Pain, and consulting editor of Neurologic Clinics of North America. Dr. Evans has been an ad hoc peer reviewer for numerous additional journals including BMJ, Lancet, Lancet Neurology, Neurology, and the New England Journal of Medicine.

Alan Finkel, MD, FAHS, received his medical degree from SUNY at Buffalo, and completed residency in Neurology and Pain/Headache Fellowship at UNC Chapel Hill. He is certified in Neurology, Pain Medicine, and Headache Medicine. He established an academic headache clinic at UNC and left to practice Headache Medicine at the Carolina Headache Institute in 2010. He then founded a not-forprofit, the Carolina Headache Foundation, and was contractor for ten years for the Defense and Veteran Brain Injury Center/Department of Defense at the Intrepid Spirit TBI Center at Fort Bragg, where he treated and studied military post traumatic headache. He is a regular reviewer for the Congressional Defense Mandated Research Program, which funds proposals aimed at reducing the burdens of pain and post traumatic headache through high-level basic and applied research. His interests include medical education, traumatic brain injury/concussion, and healthcare policy and practice. He reviews for many journals-including Neurology, Headache, and Cephalalgia—and acts as reviewer for grant proposals with NIH and the Department of Defense. His original publications included case series and prospective evaluation of patients using opioids including methadone. His recent publications focused on post traumatic headache in soldiers with mild TBI.

Deborah Friedman, MD, MPH, is a Professor in the Department of Neurology and Neurotherapeutics and the Department of Ophthalmology at UT Southwestern Medical Center. A neuroophthalmologist, Dr. Friedman is Chief of the Division of Headache Medicine and the founding Director of UT Southwestern's Headache and Facial Pain Program. She is board certified in neurology by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, with a subspecialty certification in headache medicine from the United Council for Neurologic Subspecialties. Dr. Friedman is a fellow of the American Academy of Neurology, the American Headache Society, and the North American Neuro-Ophthalmology Society. She joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2011. Dr. Friedman earned her medical degree at Tulane University Medical School. She completed a neurology residency at Baylor College of Medicine and a neuro-ophthalmology fellowship at Doheny Eye Institute in Los Angeles, CA. She also holds a Master of Public Health degree from the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry.

Linda Gray, MD, is a neuroradiologist who has been imbedded in CSF pressure disorders and treatment since 2006. She practices with a team of people at Duke who are dedicated to the diagnosis and treatment of this disorder.

Lauren King BSN, MSN, CPNP, is a Pediatric Nurse Practitioner specializing in Pediatric Neurology and Vanderbilt Children's Hospital. She is an Assistant in Pediatrics at the Vanderbilt Medical School. She works with both the Headache Clinic and the Vanderbilt Sports Concussion Center at Vanderbilt.

Brian Loftus, MD, is board certified in Neurology and Headache Medicine. He is President of Southern Headache Society, President of Bellaire Neurology, and the developer of Iheadache. Dr. Loftus is affiliated with multiple hospitals in Houston, TX, including Houston Methodist Hospital and Park Plaza Hospital. He received his medical degree from Baylor College of Medicine and has been in practice 27 years. He is one of 79 doctors at Houston Methodist Hospital, and one of 21 doctors at Park Plaza Hospital who specialize in Neurology.

Stephanie Nahas, MD, MSEd, received her undergraduate degree in biology from Harvard in 1995. She then went to Rush Medical College where, after a brief detour to obtain a master's degree in instructional technology from the University of Southern California in 1998, she earned her MD in 2001. She completed internship at Rush followed by neurology residency then fellowship in headache medicine at Thomas Jefferson University Hospital. After completing 1.5 years of fellowship training, she joined faculty and became the fellowship Program Director at the Headache Center at Thomas Jefferson University in January 2007, and is currently Associate Professor in the Department of Neurology. She also is an Assistant Director for the Neurology Residency Program at Jefferson. Dr. Nahas is a dedicated advocate for headache, having attended all but one Headache on the Hill events in Washington, DC since 2007. She is now appointed Vice President of the Alliance for Headache Disorders Advocacy as of February 2018.

Christopher Oakley, MD, as Assistant Professor of Neurology, sees patients with a variety of general pediatric neurological issues, but he focuses his clinical efforts primarily on the treatment of pediatric and adolescent headaches. He is part of the Johns Hopkins Headache Center and has established the Pediatric Headache Center at the Johns Hopkins Hospital to better serve children and adolescents with these common and potentially disabling conditions. A long-standing migraine sufferer himself, Dr. Oakley is a member of the Child Neurology Society, American Academy of Neurology, the American Headache Society, and the National Headache Foundation. He lectures frequently to the general public and to healthcare providers on a multitude of pediatric neurology topics but focuses on migraine and other childhood headaches, as this is his primary clinical focus.

Yulia Orlova, MD, PhD, DMedSc, is an Assistant Professor at the McKnight Brain Institute in the University of Florida College of Medicine in Gainesville, FL, where she is the in process of starting a headache program. Dr. Orlova was a clinical fellow from 2016 to 2017. Prior to that, she interned at Richmond University Medical Center, NY, and completed her neurology residency at Robert Wood Johnson Medical School at Rutgers, NJ. Her interests include medical education as well as clinical research.

Donald Penzien, PhD, FAHS, is Professor of Psychiatry & Behavioral Medicine, Anesthesiology, and Neurology; Associate Director for the Center of Integrative Medicine; and Director of Research for the Department of Psychiatry at Wake Forest School of Medicine. He founded and served for 27 years as Director of the Head Pain Center at the University of Mississippi Medical Center. Dr. Plato is board-certified in both neurology and headache medicine. He is vice-president of the Southern Headache Society and is on the board of directors of Runnin' For Research, a non-profit organization that promotes the public awareness of headache disorders. Dr. Plato is also an investigator on several clinical trials to develop new treatments for headache disorders.

Abigail Rao, MD, is a functional neurosurgeon with Norton Neuroscience Institute in Louisville, KY. Rebecca Erwin Wells, MD, MPH, is an Associate Professor in the Department of Neurology at Wake Forest Baptist. She founded and directs the Comprehensive Headache Program at Wake Forest Baptist and is the Section Head of Headache. She also serves as Associate Director of Clinical Research at the Wake Forest Center for Integrative Medicine and is a Board Member and Treasurer of the Southern Headache Society. She graduated from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill with highest honors, Brody School of Medicine-East Carolina University, and Harvard School of Public Health where she obtained her Master's in Public Health. She completed Internship and Neurology residency at the University of Virginia, a three-year Harvard Medical School research fellowship in Complementary and Integrative Medicine, and a second fellowship in Headache Medicine at Harvard's Brigham & Women's Faulkner Hospital. Dr. Wells is a Fellow of the American Headache Society, and has been a "Best Doctor of America" since 2015. Her research investigates the mechanisms and efficacy of mind/body treatments for headaches and receives frequent media attention, including interviews with Time magazine, NPR, BBC News, Boston Globe, and Prevention magazine. She is also passionate about overall health and well-being, and is Past-Chair of the Office of Women & Medicine's Work Life Integration subcommittee. She has published many articles and presented frequently to local and national audiences as an expert in headache, mind/body, and integrative medicine.
