Take the ACT and SAT

Complete College Applications: The Common Application CFNC and Individual applications.

Be aware of transcripts and transfer credit such as: Early College, AP, IB, CLEP or Transfer Credit.

Participate in extracurricular activities: Sports, jobs, clubs, organizations, volunteering. Medical schools require you to have at least a Bachelor's Degree. You can transfer from a NC community college to public NC university and still go to medical school.

Picking a major does not effect your acceptance into medical school as long as you have the general course requirements.

Generally: 1 year of Biology + labs, 1 year of General Chemistry + labs, 1 year of Organic Chemistry + labs, 1 year of Physics + labs.

Suggested for MCAT prep: Psychology, Sociology, Anthropology, Biochemistry.

Other opportunities to distinguish your application include: Shadowing, volunteering, clinical experiences, research.

Medical schools require you to take the MCAT exam at least one year before entering medical school.

AMCAS is the application for MD (allopathic). AACOMAS is the application for DO (osteopathic).

Applications open about one year before entering medical school. The application process includes: primary application, secondary application, and in person interviews.

Medical school is four years.

Residency is four years but sub specialties may take longer such as Maternal-Fetal Medicine.
