# Abuse in the world of CoVID

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## **Case Scenario**

- 9-year-old male referred to Child Safety Team Clinic for bruising
- Patient reportedly said that his mother spanked him with a belt because he wasn't doing his homework.
- During his interview patient reports that he always gets spankings but since he's been doing school at home "things have gotten terrible."

# It's happened before:

- Similar to what we saw during the 2008/2009 Recession
  - ► Leading cause of death from trauma changed from MVA to AHT
- Natural Disasters cause an increase in both IPV and child abuse
  - Hurricane Harvey 2019



# Things to Consider:

- Increase stress at home
  - Loss of jobs, strained finances
  - Disconnected from social support system
  - Lack of resources
    - Childcare/Daycare
    - Food shortages
  - Increased togetherness
  - Anxiety about getting sick
  - Stress of homeschooling
- Children have less contact with mandated reporters
  - > Teachers, daycare providers
  - Friends and other family members
- Calls to child abuse hotlines have gone down
  - Concern for significant under reporting

#### Things to Consider:

Cases that are being seen tend to have more severe injuries

LGBTQ+ youth are at increased risk for family rejection, abuse, homelessness, and serious mental health morbidities (including suicide)

Make sure you're talking about gun safety

Increase in home shootings (accidental and intentional)

## Intimate Partner Violence

- Dramatic spike in first two weeks of lockdown
  - People afraid of being locked down with their partners
  - Then it started to level off
- Another spike once restrictions lift
  - People can get out to get help

#### Child Safety Team

- Always have a provider on call
- Always available to see physical abuse concerns within 24-48 hours
- Happy to help triage concerns for sexual abuse

- May 1<sup>st</sup> opened an auxiliary shelter at an area hotel (Women and Children)
