# **Guided Questions**

- Are screening protocols for staff members, non-essential workers or contractors/vendors, visitors, and residents detailed in the Infection Prevention and Control Program (IPCP)?
- Are there written communication materials (e.g., flyers) to inform everyone entering the nursing home about required screening protocols and potential restrictions?

# Sample Case & Case Questions

During screening procedures, one of the residents has an out-of-state visitor, Mrs. Jackson, who claims that she had COVID-19 a few months ago and had a negative COVID-19 test 14 days after her symptoms/illness resolved. She is unable to produce the test result; she has a frequent, dry cough. Mrs. Jackson is insistent on seeing her relative and is getting upset with the screener, who is concerned that Mrs. Jackson may not meet the criteria for being permitted to visit.

- Should screeners have written policies and protocols for who may be admitted and who may not?
- How would you handle this case who would you contact for further guidance/support?
- Has your center communicated with residents and families/care partners about screening policies? Do you believe that expectations and requirements are clear?
