Dental Medicine

Dentists manage dental issues, conduct routine check-ups, diagnose and treat diseases/malformations of the teeth and gums. They may perform procedures, preventative care, or fit various appliances.

Some dentists may further specialize in areas such as orthodontics, endodontics, or pediatric dentistry.
